Thank you for offering me the opportunity to review and comment on the document entitled "proposal of Training Curriculum for Paediatric Haematology & Oncology.

I read this proposal with great interest and I found it extremely relevant for the training of the next generation of paediatric haematologists and oncologists in Hong Kong. I understand that there is currently no such subspecialty training program in Hong Kong and this proposal will certainly have a major impact on the care delivered to this unique population of patients.

The 36-month training program is in agreement with the North American and European standards. The elective module on year 3 is an excellent idea. However, without specific MOUs with other paediatric oncology/haematology centres oversea, it may be challenging for the trainees to find a fellowship opportunity outside Hong Kong. I am sure that many centres in Europe or in North America would be interested in such a partnership.

The description of the training program is very detailed and I fully support the training syllabus. I see that there is a requirement to publish at least one peer review paper in a local or international journal, which is good. However I did not see any reference to a mentorship program, which could be very helpful for the trainees (every trainee would have a supervisor with regular face to face meetings during the 36 month period). I also did not see any section that relates to radiation oncology rotation. This would be important to know the basics of radiotherapy, which is still a key component of many treatments in children.

There is also a requirement to attend meetings and training courses at least once a year. I know, I may be biased with my "SIOP hat", but I think it would be important to include at least one international meeting (this can be SIOP or SIOP Asia or another international PHO meeting) during the 3 year period.

Overall, the program is very detailed and comprehensive, and I fully support it. This is really a very timely proposal in the context of the opening of the new Children Hospital in Hong Kong. I have no doubt that the official development of this subspecialty will also benefit children affected with haematological and oncological conditions.
