# MessagefromthePresidentinthe12thAnnual General Meeting

On behalf of the Council of Hong Kong College of Paediatricians I wish to thank you all for participating in today's Ceremony of Admission of New Fellows. My sincere congratulations go to all the new Fellows who will be admitted shortly. You have completed your training programme and passed the assessments in paediatrics. You will be eligible for the Fellowship of the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine, and for registration as specialists in paediatrics with the Medical Council of Hong Kong. The College will rely on you to uphold the standard of paediatric practice and to protect the interests of the children of Hong Kong.

Training and education remained on the top of the agenda of the College during the past year. Our College now requires all trainees to undergo six months' training in child health. I wish to thank the Director of Health and the Chief Executive of the Hospital Authority for their support in enabling our trainees to undergo training in the maternal and child health centres. A Task Force within the College is currently studying the status of paediatric subspecialties in Hong Kong. I am therefore grateful to a College Fellow whose family, through the Providence Foundation, has made a generous donation of \$900,000 to support the College in conducting training and review of the development of paediatric subspecialties. To encourage more young doctors to join our discipline the College has recently established a prize in Paediatrics at each of the two local universities.

Every one of us here might have been distressed by the outbreak of Severe Acute Respiratory Syndrome (SARS) earlier this year. The College had to suspend all training, educational and social activities during the period of the outbreak. The Council considered that the exposure to SARS was a unique experience for all our members and hence agreed that a period of experience related to SARS of not more than six months could be counted as training in paediatrics. I wish to thank those Fellows and their families who have pledged to provide medical and psychological care to the children who have lost their parents because of SARS. I am also grateful to Mrs. Helen Yeung and her team of lady volunteers for their commitments and dedication in providing long-term emotional, psychological and social support to such children and their families.

It has been a privilege to serve you as the President in the past six years. I believe that it is because of your support and active participation that the mission of the College could be accomplished. May I take this opportunity to thank you for your valuable contributions and guidance? I wish also to express my sincere gratitude to the members of the Council, Committees and Subcommittees for their advice, dedication and counsel in guiding me to serve you and the College. I hope that you will continue to give your strong support to my successor, Professor TF Fok and his Council.

#### Consultation Document on Regulation of Health Claims

The Hong Kong College of Paediatricians welcomes the Government's proposal to regulate health claims of food products in view of the rise in claims of specific beneficial health effects and misleading or exaggerated claims. We support the prohibition of claims listed in Appendix 3 of the above document, but we would further urge the Government to include in the regulation, health claims of food for infants and young children.

Regarding food for infants and young children, there are concerns related to both areas stated in the consultation document, namely, "Claims relating to body functions which may delay the public seeking proper medical advice and management" and "Exaggerated or misleading health-related claims". An example of the former includes milk formula being labelled as "hypoallergenic" when the consumption of which for an infant with true allergy to cow's milk could lead to serious health consequences. Another example is formula labelled 'Antireflux' promoted for the relief of 'vomiting of milk' in infants. The spitting up of milk by infants could vary from possetting, physiological phenomenon that requires no treatment, to that of pathological vomiting, the delayed treatment of which could also be detrimental to the infant's health. As for exaggerated or misleading claims of food products for infants and young children, benefits in relation to both physical and developmental health abound.

The consultation document considers the risk of claims in relation to public health. The feeding and nutrition of infants and young children are major public health issues, the subject of numerous resolutions of the World Health Assembly (WHA) of the World Health Organization. A WHA Resolution in May 2001 affirms the recommendation of "exclusive breastfeeding for six months... and to provide safe and complementary foods, with continued breastfeeding for up to two years of age or beyond...". This recommendation is also adopted by the Department of Health in Hong Kong. For complementary foods and feeding practices, the WHA Resolution further stressed the need of "ensuring sound and culture-specific nutrition counselling to mothers of young children, recommending the widest possible use of indigenous nutrient-rich foodstuffs...". The emphasis is therefore on breastfeeding and fresh local foods rather than expensive, processed and packaged food with various exaggerated or dubious health claims. We are not against the sale of food specially formulated for infants and young children but the use of various health claims to promote such food products to the public.

The education of the public on feeding and nutrition of infants and young children is the responsibility of healthcare professionals, and is too important to be under the influence of industries with commercial interest. Optimal infant feeding practices are the basis of child health and the health of children is the foundation of the health of a nation. The Hong Kong College of Paediatricians therefore urges that the Regulation of Health Claims to be extended to food products of infants and young children.

#### Appendix I

#### Guidelines on Application of Prospective Accreditation of Higher Training Programme undertaken by Trainees in Overseas Institutions

The trainees who wish to undergo higher training in overseas institutions should apply prospectively to the Accreditation Committee at least 3 months before the commencement of overseas training.

Trainees must supply the following documents and information to the Accreditation Committee for prospective approval 3 months before commencement of overseas training:

- i) Application letter for prospective approval;
- ii) Period of overseas training and duration;
- iii) Subspecialty, Institution/ Training Centre, Country;
- iv) Name of supervisor;
- v) Institution information : background of the institution and institution accreditation status (whether it is a locally accredited training centre for the paediatric subspecialty);
- vi) Preliminary Training Programme (activities involved);
- vii) Undertaking by applicant on the status of the institution that it is a locally accredited training centre for the paediatric subspecialty;
- viii) Acceptance letter from overseas training center;
- ix) Recommendation letter by local training supervisor/ COS;

Applications will not be processed unless all required documents are submitted with preliminary approval by the COS/training supervisor. All overseas higher training applications will be acknowledged and outstanding information will be requested. The Accreditation Committee accepts that all the necessary information and documentation required may not be available before commencement of overseas training. If the trainee responds by giving a valid reason why such documentation is not available and undertakes to provide the outstanding information and documentation within three months upon return from training overseas, this would be acceptable to the Committee. A preliminary approval by the Honorary Secretary of the Accreditation Committee will be issued after the application has been approved by the Accreditation Committee.

Unless a valid reason is provided for a trainee's inability to provide the necessary documentation prior to commencement of overseas training, submission of the necessary documentation upon completion of overseas training for accreditation will be treated as retrospective accreditation subjected to an administrative charge of HK\$2,000.00. This regulation will be strictly enforced with effect from the 1 January 2004.

The trainee should submit the following information within 3 months upon return from training to the Accreditation Committee for final approval of his higher training at the overseas institution:

- i) Application letter for final approval;
- ii) Training report by the applicant, including the finalized full training programme and duty roster
- iii) Training summary and log sheet, duly signed by the overseas supervisor;
- iv) Summary of project and/or publication achieved during the training period;
- v) Declaration by trainee that the information submitted is true and accurate;
- vi) Local supervisor's evaluation together with recommendations towards accreditation.

The Committee reserves the right to write to the supervisor abroad directly for additional information. If all the criteria as required by the Accreditation Committee are satisfied, a letter of accreditation will be issued to the trainee as official approval of his higher training at the overseas institution.
