PALS Course a Great Success

The College held the second series of Paediatric Advanced Life Support Courses (Provider and Instructor) on the 8th to 11th July 2000 at the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Jockey Club Building. This year, the College accepted 120 applicants for the two provider courses whereas 26 applicants filled the instructor course.

Professors NK Leung and TF Fok (President and Vice-President of the College) led the opening introduction of the provider courses with Dr Alfred HuYoung (PALS Course Faculty Director), Dr David Jaimovich (overseas Faculty) and other local Faculty members on the 8th and 10th July 2000 morning.

The provider courses comprised of lectures, skill stations, teaching and evaluation stations. The fun of the course lay in hand-on practice and experience sharing with instructors from different hospitals. Applicants received their certificates duly after full participation and success in the test.

From the Accreditation Committee

Basic Training Rotation

Training hospitals are requested to submit their basic trainee programme every six months. A floppy disc will be sent to COSs periodically to facilitate data entry. Trainers are reminded that they could not take up more than 3 trainees at any one time (with the combination of either 2 basic and 1 higher trainee or vice versa).

Training Verification

To avoid unnecessary confusion, it was clarified that the Membership Committee and Examination Committee would take up the responsibility of verifying basic and higher training respectively.

Training Accreditation

Interrupted training would be recognized if the following criteria are fulfilled:

- 1 the interruption should be less than one year;
- 2 the trainee should show his/her intention for further training;
- 3 there must be a justifiable reason for the interruption, either because of medical or other compassionate reason;
- 4 the trainee must follow the regulations laid down by the Academy (including the Grandfather clause);
- 5 the Council holds the final discretion.

Accreditation of Training of Overseas Trainees

Application for accreditation of training, no matter on local or overseas basis, should be supported by log data, declaration, and supervisor's support.

Recognition of Higher Training

As some misunderstandings arose from the previous announcement on the recognition of higher training, the Accreditation Committee would like to clarify the following issues:

- 1 higher training which commenced before 1.7.2000 (and after 1.7.1997) will be assessed with a sympathetic approach;
- training which commenced after 1.7.2000 should follow the new guidelines strictly;
- 3 COSs and training supervisors will be informed of the new guidelines individually;
- 4 Training commenced after 1.7.2000 should not comprise of more than 6 months of child-health related subspecialty and prospective approval should be sought.

Call for CME Annual Return Form

To those Fellows who started their CME cycle on 1st July each year, we would like to remind them to send in their Annual Return Form (together with copies of attendance certificates of any overseas meetings) to the College Secretary before 15th August.

What happens when CME Requirement is not being fulfilled

The Academy had recently released an announcement on the consequences of Non-fulfillment of CME Requirements by Fellows of the Academy, together with guideline on Reinstatement of Fellowship which has ceased as a result of non-compliance of CME requirements or other reasons. These are reprinted in Appendix 1 for Fellows' information.

We would like to remind our College Fellows that CME is a statutory requirement which all Fellows of the Academy are required to fulfil. Failure to comply will now attract the consequences laid down by the Academy. It is to be noted that in CME matters the College's role is that of an agent that administers the CME programme for paediatricians on behalf of the Academy, and that the College Fellowship is NOT affected by non-fulfillment of CME requirements.

MRCPCH/Intermediate Examination Part I

The marking of the Part I Examination will be changed from the Examination in September 2000 onwards. There will be no deduction of marks for wrong answers in True and False questions. See Appendix 2 for details.

Exit Assessment

The next Exit Assessment of our College will be in December 2000. Candidates will need to submit 4 dissertations with one from each of the following categories:

- 1 research project
- 2 critical review of a clinical problem
- 3 case report

Dissertations comprising only of original research or critical review are also acceptable.

Candidates would be assessed on clinical experience/competence, service related issues and critical paper appraisal. Please note the deadline of application for the coming exit assessment is 15th October 2000.

With effect from 2001, the deadline for application will be 31st March for the June Exit Assessment and 30th September for the December Exit Assessment. All COSs and training supervisors are requested to take note of the change.

From the Professional and General Affairs Committee

Statement on Air Pollution

The College has endorsed a statement on "Air Pollution" (Appendix 3) which will be submitted to the Government.

An autumn respiratory seminar would be held on 12 November 2000 on air pollution. A press conference would also be held to alert the public on the seriousness of air pollution in Hong Kong. The College would be one of the six societies hosting this campaign. The other societies include the Hong Kong Thoracic Society, Hong Kong and Macau Chapter of the American College of Chest Physicians, Hong Kong Lung Foundations, Hong Kong College of Physicians and Hong Kong Society of Paediatric Respiratology.

Survey on the Use of Information Technologies

The College Council has laid down the direction that the use of information technologies as a means of communication among our colleagues, should be one of the priority areas for development in the near future. We would like to have your opinions and input to our planning, so that strategies in this area will meet your expectations and needs. In the coming few weeks, you will receive a survey questionnaire from us by fax. We understand that you are all busy people. The survey will be limited to up to two pages and it will only take up a little of your time. We need your support for the survey.

Trainees' Committee

The College Council resolved that in order to increase the transparency of College functions and to facilitate the involvement of trainees in College affairs, a Trainees' Committee will be set up with representatives sitting in during Council meetings.

Coming College AGM

Please take note that this year's College AGM will be held on Thursday, 30th November 2000 at the Hong Kong Academy of Medicine Building, Aberdeen.

Congratulations

Our heartfelt congratulations to Prof NK Leung, our College President on his receipt of the Bronze Bauhinia Star of the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region. The award was made 'for dedicated and meritorious services in the medical profession and valuable contribution to the community".

Non-fulfillment of CME Requirements

1. Retired from active practice

The Academy will be prepared to grant exemption for CME if Council is convinced that the Fellow concerned has retired from active clinical practice. However, the Academy will inform the Medical Council that the Fellow concerned does not fulfil the CME requirements for the purpose of Specialist Registration.

The Academy will consider application for CME exemption from a Fellow only if he/she has formally submitted a written declaration to the Academy/College that he/she has retired from active clinical practice.

A Fellow who subsequently resumes active clinical practice will be required to make up for CME points as if he/she has never retired.

If a Fellow who has been exempted from CME subsequently wants the Academy to certify him/her for Specialist Registration, he/she will be required to have obtained the minimum number of accreditable CME points for a CME cycle counting back from the date of application for certification.

2. Remediable non-compliance

- a) Fellows must:
 - i) have achieved not less than 60 points within the cycle; OR
 - ii) be certified to have suffered from a medical condition which Council considers as a reasonable cause for the CME non-compliance.

The Academy may, at its discretion, accept other conditions if supported by Colleges on reasonable grounds.

- b) These Fellows must engage in a remedial programme to make up for the deficiency.
- c) The reasons for non-compliance and the remedial CME programme must be endorsed by the Education Committee.
- d) The remedial programme must be finished within the time specified by the appropriate College. In any case, the remedial programme must be finished within 13 months from the time of decision.
- e) The next CME cycle of these Fellows should follow immediately after the previous cycle without any break. In other words, these Fellows will have to undergo normal and remedial CME at the same time.

3. Non-compliance that are not remediable

The Academy will inform the Medical Council that these Fellows do not fulfil the CME requirements. Upon reviewing each case, a recommendation for Fellowship suspension will be made. Reinstatement of Academy Fellowship shall be (a) at the discretion of the Council, and (b) upon payment of fees as determined by the Academy from time to time, and (c) subjected to requirements including remedial CME and/or reassessment as determined by the Academy from time to time.

Reinstatement of Fellowship

The following guidelines apply to reinstatement applications by ex-Fellows whose Fellowship has ceased due to non-payment of subscription/fees, resignation or non-compliance of CME requirements.

I. Requirements for Reinstatement

Reinstatement of Academy Fellowship shall be:

- a) at the discretion of the Council, and
- b) upon payment of fees as determined by the Academy from time to time, and
- c) subjected to requirements including remedial CME and/or reassessment as determined by the Academy from time to time. In principle, applicants will be required to have obtained the minimum number of accreditable CME points for a CME cycle counting back from the date of application for reinstatement. For those whose exit examination was passed within 36 months before the date of application for reinstatement, CME requirements may be counted on pro-rata basis at the discretion of the Academy.

II. Fees payable upon reinstatement

Notes:

- a) Resignation must be in written form.
- b) Any subscription/fee due and unsettled before removal or notice of resignation will be regarded as outstanding subscription/fee.
- c) The multipliers on outstanding subscription/fees are imposed to cover inflationary factor due to delayed payment.

III. Reinstatement procedures

- a) When an application for reinstatement is received, the Secretariat will ask the College to confirm (i) whether the applicant is still a full member of the College, and (ii) whether the applicant has fulfilled CME requirements for reinstatement (see I above), and (iii) whether the College will object to the reinstatement.
- b) Application with a College's confirmation will be circulated to the Membership Committee for consideration. The Committee's recommendation will then be put to Council for endorsement.
- c) Following Council's approval, the applicant will be required to pay a reinstatement fee, current subscription and outstanding subscriptions (if any) according to prevailing policy (see II above).
- d) Academy Fellowship will only be reinstated after fees are settled. The College concerned will be informed once reinstatement is confirmed.
- e) The CME cycle of a reinstated Fellow should commence within 6 months after reinstatement of Fellowship.

MRCPCH Part I Examination

Important Notice to Candidates

Candidates should note that with effect from the 2000/3 sitting of the MRCPCH Part I Examination taking place in September 2000 and all sittings thereafter, the negative marking of incorrect answers will cease.

This will affect how candidates are scored in the examination. Candidates will continue to be awarded one mark (+1) for each correct answer (i.e. A true statement indicated as true, or a false statement indicated as false). However, a zero mark will be awarded for each incorrect answer (i.e. A true statement indicated as false and vice versa) and for 'don't know' answers.

Candidates should note that the pass rate of candidates in a particular examination sitting will remain the same and candidates will continue to be assessed in relation to that of the other candidates.

Mark sheets currently used in the MRCPCH examinations will continue in the same format, i.e. three potential responses are available for each question: true, false and don't know.

Statement on Air Pollution

Clean air. There's only so much to go around. Air pollution harms us all.

Air pollution means premature death for several thousands of people in Hong Kong each year. It strikes hardest at those who need our care most – children, the elderly and people who are already sick.

What happens when you inhale pollutants? Tiny particles and gases move deep into your lungs and into you bloodstream. The insides of your lungs can become damaged and inflamed. This damage also makes it easier for you to get sick. Over time, air pollution can cause permanent changes to your lungs, just like smoking.

Worried about you children breathing dirty air? You have good reason to be. Their lungs are still developing, and since they breathe faster and tend to spend more time outdoors being active, air pollution affects them much more.

- Children living in areas with heavy traffic have more chest problems, such as chest infections and asthma, than those living in cleaner environment.
- During days with high air pollution, more people with asthma, chronic lung diseases or heart diseases have to see their doctors or are admitted to hospital because their disease get worse. Some may even die.
- A small increase in lung cancer risk has also been reported as a result of living in heavily polluted cities.
- Shorter life expectancy of people living in polluted areas compared with those living in cleaner environment by 2 to 3 years.

Of the above, respirable suspended particles (RSP) are most harmful.

In Hong Kong, the major source of particles is from vehicle emissions, especially those using diesel. In 1997, 52% of all particles came from diesel vehicles. There are 146,000 diesel vehicles in Hong Kong and account for 70% of the total distance travelled on the roads.

CLEARING THE AIR

Air pollution, smog and global warming can affect your health. Find out what you can do about them.

Short term actions that can reduce pollution in Hong Kong

- Increase fine of smoky vehicles from \$400 to \$1000, with progressive increase in fine with each offence up to \$5000 for the third offence
- Use of ultra low sulphur diesel with sulphur content of 0.005%. Current diesel used is 0.05%.
- For taxis to convert to LPG fuel
- Fitting particle traps to diesel vehicles
- No illegal diesel to be sold or used

How to protect yourself and your children during air pollution episodes

- Be aware: listen and watch for media and government smog advisories.
- Reduce exposure by decreasing time spent outdoors
- Reduce your level of physical activity outside
- Eat lots of fresh fruits and vegetables to increase antioxidants in your body
- If you think dirty air is affecting your health, consult your doctor

Ways to make the earth a healthier place to live

- Walk, cycle, take public transportation
- Keep your car well tuned
- Choose the most energy-efficient vehicles
- Turn the car engine off when it is idling
- In summer, set air-conditioning to 22 degrees and wear cooler clothes
- Install efficient lighting, such as compact fluorescent light bulbs
- Turn off lights and any other electric appliance when they are not in use

Air pollution and global warming – a double threat to the planet

Air pollution is caused by burning coal, oil, gasoline and natural gas. But as if this dirty air wasn't bad enough, burning these same fuels creates a second threat.

It's carbon dioxide, the main greenhouse gas that causes global warming. All the carbon dioxide we release from cars, power plants, and factories adds to the warming effect of the atmosphere.

Studies show the world is getting hotter. That's bad for our health.

Just as a fever puts you under the weather, global warming does the same for the planet.

Twelve of the hottest years on record have occurred since 1982, and 1998 was the hottest year of the millenium.

More hear waves will make us all uncomfortable. But they could also mean illness and death for some of us who can't find ways to cool off.

Hot weather increases the production of ground level ozone that is harmful to the lungs.

Many pests prefer warm climates. A warmer Hong Kong could attract more mosquitoes and may bring more malaria and other illnesses.

Finally, global warming has been linked to increases in extreme weather such as heat waves, extreme cold spells, typhoons and flooding or drought.
